Sometimes it may be challenging to connect with the stories of scripture thousands of years old. What could those stories have to say about life in 2015? Is it possible when we discover the heart of a scriptural story – staying with it long

enough so that 'deep speaks to deep' – that we may find it's not as far away as we thought? In this sermon we will explore sacred stories that may be just as relevant today as when they were first written.

January 25th: Language of the Heart
