# WHAT'S IN OUR BACKYARD?





APPLES - Growers continue to pack Royal Gala, McIntosh, Empire, Cortland, Red Delicious as well as Ambrosia and Honey crisp out of controlled atmosphere storages. Gold Delicious are running out quickly and Royal Galas will last until March.

CABBAGE - Savoy, green and red cabbage continue here in Ontario.

CARROT - Demand for Ontario Carrots is strong and pricing remains high. We will be starting the transition to Mexican Carrots mid-February. Heirloom carrot supplies are still good and steady with pricing.

**ENGLISH CUCUMBERS** – Ontario grown cucumbers are getting better in supply. Ontario supplies will improve by the end of February while

Mexico is expected to have supply, but less than what we've seen recently. HOTHOUSE TOMATO - Ontario tomato production is finished with vine tomato all that is in production that is local as it is under lights. By the first week of April, the Ontario season will be getting started.

MUSHROOMS - Mushrooms markets continue to be extremely active due to the high demand at retail. This will affect availability and quality on food service items, particularly button mushrooms.

**ONION -** Yellow cooking onions continue with good supply and quality.

POTATO - Potatoes are available in all colors (white, red and yellow). Mini B size are in good supply, while C sizes are finished. Large #1 chefs continue.

WAX TURNIP (RUTABAGA) - Ontario rutabaga continues with good supplies.

Corn remains very active and supplies are unstable in Florida as volume has not improved yet out of Homestead. Volume to remain tight. in the coming weeks.

# **FRUITS**





MacIntosh, Empire and Red Delicious are in good supply. Royal Galas will start to wind down as we finish February, while Gold Delicious are essentially finished.

Historically, we see pricing slowly start to increase after the Super Bowl through the spring months, and we are beginning to see field prices stay consistent with that trend.

# **BLUEBERRIES**



While growers picked ahead, which will keep the market stable for at least the next 3 weeks, expectations are that we will see an early end to the import season and very light supply at the end of February.

# **RASPBERRIES**



Look for this market to remain very expensive with very limited supplies

# **BLACKBERRIES**



Demand exceeds supply. As with raspberries, and the cold in Mexico and rain is driving up the market on blackberries as less production is coming on.

# **STRAWBERRIES**


Valentine's Day demand is in full swing which has made all berry categories very tight out of California, Mexico and Florida.

# LETTUCES



ICEBERG - Strong supplies are expected throughout this week. Weights are averaging 41-46 Pounds. Slight discoloration, and misshapen heads have been reported, but minimally. Quality has been very good. Expect competitive pricing throughout the week.

**ROMAINE / LEAF - Romaine as well** as green leaf will be plentiful throughout this week. Red leaf is the least of all the greens being harvested but there is plenty to fill all demand. Weights on romaine are averaging 34-37 pounds while green and red leaf are 20-23 pounds. Romaine hearts will be plentiful as well all week.



has been good with occasional yellowing and bruising of the tender leaves.

# CITRUS - LEMONS



The market is trending up and supplies are moving toward the limited side as Mexico is finished, leaving just California lemons. Watch the market in coming days as heavy rains are expected.

The imported grape market remains tight on both the east and west coasts, with continued vessel and container delays limiting availability.

# ONIONS



Size profiles on all colors continue leaning toward heavier to larger sizes, which is expected to continue as the program continues for the next three months. The market still has a good chance.

### PEPPERS



**GREEN** -Weak demand has led to some weakness in the markets. Florida continues to produce steady volume, but the weather from last week will have an impact in the upcoming weeks.

**RED** - We expect good volume and quality over the next week.

# POTATOES



Strong yields on the storage crop offset lower output for early table potato crops. That may have shifted production more toward chip potato varieties.

# ZUCCHINI



High winds and cold temperatures do not go well with zucchini, and this is what took place last week in Florida. There was freeze damage reported on some of the fields, so expect supply disruption in the upcoming weeks.

## PINEAPPLES



Quality is reported as good, but the somewhat unstable weather of the previous days has been affecting the internal condition with some water spotting and ultraviolet radiation.

# PEARS



There are good supplies of D'Anjou, Bosc, and red pears out of Washington and Oregon. The overall crop is smaller this season which will put pressure on supplies this year. Bartlett pears have finished for the season.

# STONE FRUIT



Supply is limited on Chilean peaches, plums and nectarines due to shipping delays and unloading of vessel delays arriving at ports in Philadelphia and Los Angeles. Quality is good with steady pricing.

• TOMATOES



Round tomato prices are easing due to increasing supplies in Florida and Mexico. The grape tomato market is much lower as well; yields are rising. Florida growers are back in production.

## WATERMELON

Demand is good and markets are easing as supplies increase from Mexico, Florida and offshore.
